

We live in Europe.


There are 44 countries in Europe.

Famous landmarks: Eifel Tower, The Louvre, Disneyland Paris The index page of an atlas tells you what page you can find a country, city or area.




Pyrenees mountainsseparating France and Spain.

human features	Something that is built by humans and would not have existed in nature without humans
physical features	Process that occur naturally, without humans.
European Union	The EU stands for the European Union, a unified trade and monetary body made up of 27 member countries, collectively covering most of the European continent. It's a special eco-political entity that eliminates all border controls between members, allowing the free movement of people and goods within the European single market.
Mediterranean	There are 21 countries that surround the Mediterranean Sea and they are known as the Mediterranean countries
Euros	The euro (symbol: €; code: EUR) is the official currency of 20 of the 27 member states of the European Union (EU).
